Topic: Animals around us **Curriculum link:** Living Things **Text type:** Question and answer

Reading level: 3 **Word count:** 69

High-frequency words: this, it, a, what, is **Vocabulary:** tail, bird, cat, fish, duck, goat, lizard

Possible literacy focus: Using question marks.

Identifying final digraphs /sh/ and /ck/.

Follow-up activities

Data chart

Using the animals in the book, fill in a chart like the one below. Encourage the children to think about the different purposes of animals' tails.

Animal	Covering on tail	Purpose of tail
peacock	feathers	show to female birds to attract mate
cat	fur	balance warmth
fish	scales	balance to move forward

Sorting tails

Have children search through a range of books to find animals that have tails. Children can draw some of these animals onto cards. Have the children sort the cards according to their own criteria, such as those with furry tails. Cards can be presented as a diagram and displayed.

Puppets

Using a range of materials (paper bags, wool, buttons, coloured paper, icy-pole sticks, straws, stockings) children can make puppets of animals that have tails. When they have finished they can introduce their puppet to the class, explaining what sort of tail it has and what it uses its tail for.




Tail puzzle




- 1. Cut out pictures of animals with tails.

- 6. Share your work to see if your drawn tail looks like the real tail.




Instructions Ask children to match each tail to an animal. Then each sentence can be completed. Encourage children to use the possessive apostrophe, modelled in the book.




